A Message from Year 2:

What time should a seven year old go to bed?

As class teachers we get asked this question often during the academic year so we hope this information helps you. During the month of March, it was Sleep Awareness Week (10th -16th). According to the National Sleep Foundation (NSF), a seven-year-old needs 9 to 11 hours of sleep every night. If your child needs to be awake for school at, say 6:30 am, the reasonable hour for bedtime can be between 7:15pm and the latest, 7:45pm. Sleep is especially important for children and young people because it helps with their mental, physical, social and emotional



development. Sleep helps our brains to remember, memorise and analyse important information. If your child will not go to bed try and set up a routine. Decide on a time and start a winding down bedtime routine around thirty minutes before. Set a limit on how much time you spend with your child when you put them to bed. For example, read only one story then tuck them in and say goodnight. If your child gets up, keep putting them back to bed again with as little fuss as possible. Try to be consistent and remember Rome wasn't built in a day! These skills will improve performance at school and hopefully be beneficial for the whole family.

Celebrated annually on the first Thursday in March, World Book Day is always one of the highlights of the year in school. The children love the celebration of authors, illustrations, books and most importantly the joy of reading. All the children enjoyed organised activities

throughout the course of the week that stretched their imagination and encouraged creative writing, character descriptions and designing their own front covers for a book. A fundamental part of this day is that it offers children the opportunity to exchange a token for a discount off a full-price book. Snapchat is a photo sharing app for phones and tablets. The app allows users to share photos, videos and messages with friends.



What do you need to know?

The app states users must be minimum of 13 years old.

However, Common Sense Media rates Snapchat OK for teens 16 and up, mainly because of the exposure to age-inappropriate content and the marketing ploys, such as quizzes, that collect data.

National Online Safety said in a study, Snapchat was ranked 4th worst app in terms of having an impact on young people's health and wellbeing, with children feeling they can use the app to "make you look pretty".
